



Mount Martha Boardwalk

and tracks

in the Balcombe Estuary Reserves

Immerse yourself in nature with an easy stroll along one of Victoria's biodiversity gems – the Mount Martha Boardwalk. Nestled in a wetland sanctuary beside Mount Martha Village, just 60 kms from Melbourne's CBD, the Boardwalk is part of 3.5 km of bushland tracks that meander along Balcombe Creek from the coast to the Nepean Hwy and on to The Briars.

Listen to the frogs croaking and the wrens chirping as you amble beneath a canopy of majestic paperbarks; feast your eyes on soaring silver banksias and tiny correas; keep your eyes peeled for a graceful egret at the water's edge, a shy echidna, or a burrowing swamp rat ... and learn about biodiversity along the way from helpful signs, interpretive boards and audio trails provided by BERG Mt Martha—www.berg.org.au.

The Reserves

The Balcombe Estuary Reserves were declared in 1987 and cover 44 hectares. Traditional owners, The Boonerwung people, called the Balcombe Creek area Tji'tjin'garook – the voice of frogs!

The network of paths and boardwalk was established by the Rotary Club of Mount Martha in 1987.

BERG Mt Martha?

BERG is a friends group formed in 1997 to preserve and restore the bushland of the Balcombe Estuary Reserves at Mt Martha. Its work is supported by Mornington Peninsula Shire, Melbourne Water and numerous government and non-government agencies and funding bodies.

Flora & Fauna

Be amazed by the diversity of species that have made their home in the largest and most intact estuary on the east of Port Phillip Bay!

Plants ... include native orchids, tiny ground hugging herbs, flowering Wattles, Correas and Hibbertias, Swamp Paperbarks, She-oaks, stately Manna Gums and Coastal Banksias.

At the saline fringes, you'll see aquatic herb field species like Swamp Crassula, Creeping Brookweed, Shiny Swamp-mat and Chaffy Sawsedge, Knobby Club-sedge, Australian Salt-grass and Beaded Glasswort. Notice the reed beds, dominated by Phragmites and Juncus.

Take special care of our rare or threatened species in the reserve, including the Cherry Ballart, Chaffy Saw-sedge, Grassland Cranesbill, Knobby Club-sedge, and Coarse Twine-rush.

Birds ... Watch out for the many tiny birds that dip and dive inside the scrub: Robins, Whistlers, Wrens, Flycatchers, Yellow Robins, Pardalotes, Grey Shrike Thrushes, Finches, Mistletoebirds, Fantails, Thornbills and Honeyeaters. Check out our larger birds too: Frogmouths, Kookaburras,

Goshawks, Rosellas, Lorikeets, Magpies, Ravens and Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoos.

There's a host of Wetland birds that love the estuary for its changing water levels, rich food supplies, and thick reeds for nesting and roosting. Can you spy a Cormorant, Pelican, Duck, Rail or Crake? You might also be lucky enough to catch a glimpse of a Great Egret or Royal Spoonbill – two birds of special significance here in Victoria.

Reptiles ... Look carefully amongst the fallen logs and under-story plants that may be sheltering a Common Scaly-foot, Tree Dragon, several varieties of Skink, Blotched Blue-tongue, Low-land Copperhead or a not so friendly Tiger Snake.

Mammals ... our picturesque Melaleuca scrub is home to Echidnas, Brushtail and Ringtail Possums, Sugar Gliders, several Micro Bat species and Swamp Rats digging burrows.

In the water ... if you study the logs and reeds in the of Balcombe Creek and its estuary you might see a Short-finned Eel or the nationally threatened Dwarf Galaxia; Southern Pygmy Perch, Small-mouthed Hardyhead, Flat headed Gudgeon, Blue-spot and Bridled Goby, Yellow-eyed Mullet, Greenback Flounder and Smooth Toadfish.

Listen carefully and you can you hear the voices of our diverse and cheeky frog population.

How to get there

It's easy. Catch a train from Melbourne to Frankston and then a bus to Mount Martha Village via The Esplanade or take a drive along the new Mornington Frankston Freeway.

The Boardwalk is flat, wheelchair accessible, and an ideal adventure for families, dog walkers, strollers and runners.

Parking

A free car park is located in Mirang Ave.

Please do not remove logs or ground material that provide habitat for native fauna.

Keep dogs on a lead and remove droppings. Cats and other pets are not permitted.

A recreational fishing licence is required to fish from platforms along the creek.
